What's Included in the OLLI Fall 2025 Catalog

At the time of printing, the information included in the fall catalog was current and accurate. Any updates to the listed information (changes, additions, cancellations, etc.) will be announced in OLLI's weekly newsletter, *Connections*, and online entries of courses and programs will be corrected to reflect the new information.

OLLI courses are typically 5-6 weeks long and meet once a week for 90 minutes. Courses explore a wide range of topics and are offered both in-person and online via Zoom. Class sessions are offered Monday-Saturday with varying times throughout the day, including some evening courses.

OLLI Talks are one-time lectures, presentations, or workshops typically held over the noon hour.

Shared Interest Groups (SIGs) are created around a common interest and like to meet outside the normal OLLI class environment to discuss and enjoy this mutual interest. Each group is different depending on

its focus, and all provide interesting lifelong learning opportunities as well as fun social experiences.

Introduction to Traditional Yang Style Tai Chi

Students will acquire a comprehensive understanding of the distinctive characteristics of Yang-style Tai Chi, often referred to as "meditation in motion." The Yang postures are characterized by their relaxed and expansive nature, simplicity, precision in composition, central alignment, and harmonious movements, which incorporate both hard and soft elements, lightness of spirit, and heaviness of application. The postures can be positioned at high, middle, or low stances that accommodate individual age, physical condition, and specific needs. This flexibility makes the Yang form particularly suitable for protecting and improving health, as it enhances strength, balance, and overall fitness. Students will begin each class with warm-up exercises that promote softness, relaxation, and looseness. We will also explore the essential common principles and concepts. Students will develop body awareness, balance, looseness, meditation, and relaxation.

Facilitator: From 2003 to 2018, John "Jack" Walsh extensively studied Yang-style Tai Chi hand and sword forms under the guidance of Master Liang Yin Zhao at Murray Hill Chinese School in New Jersey. Following his retirement from the Senior Executive Service of the United States, Jack has dedicated himself to studying Traditional Yang Tai Chi for Martial Arts under the supervision of Master Huan Zhang (former OLLI instructor) and Sifu David Watts. Jack has received two Instructor Certifications for Tai Chi for Arthritis and Tai Chi for Fall Prevention from Dr. Paul Lam of the Tai Chi for Health Institute. Subsequently, Jack has been teaching Tai Chi for Arthritis and Fall Prevention for Brigham and Women's Hospital, at the Boston Public Library. In May 2025, Master Zhang conferred upon Jack an Instructor Certification for Traditional Tai Chi Instructor - Beginner Level.

S Blocked by Caste in India – and in America? A Global Discussion of Systemic Forms of Discrimination

Amidst enormous social upheaval after the murder of George Floyd in 2020, Isabel Wilkerson published her book Caste: The Origins of Our Discontents. In it, Wilkerson drew connections between racism in America and the caste system of India (as well as the ideology of Nazi Germany). Is the caste system the same as racial discrimination? Is there a caste system in the U.S.? What can the experiences of millions of marginalized caste people in India and the U.S. teach us about inequality, identity, and justice? In this course we will discuss these questions guided both by Wilkerson's book as well as the experiences of instructor Mahesh Admankar, a member both of an oppressed caste in India as well as a person of color in the United States. Further, the course explores how caste shapes Indian and American society and economy—past, present, and future—while drawing parallels to global systems of exclusion based on race, gender, and other categories.

Facilitator: Mahesh Admankar is a PhD Candidate in Public Policy at UMass Boston. He earned his bachelor's degree in social science and master's in economics in India. Prior to pursuing his doctorate at UMB, Mahesh worked as an assistant professor of economics for four years in Hyderabad, India. His research interests are discrimination in the labor market, healthcare, education, climate justice, and social exclusion. He has taught several courses with OLLI. S Learning Physics Through Simple Experiments

"Learning Physics Through Simple Experiments" is a dynamic and engaging course designed to introduce students to fundamental principles of physics through hands-on experimentation. This course emphasizes a practical approach to understanding complex concepts by demonstrating various scientific laws and theories through easily replicable experiments. Students will explore topics such as motion, forces, energy, and waves, gaining a deeper understanding of the underlying principles of physics in an interactive and accessible learning environment. Through this course, students will develop critical thinking skills and a deeper appreciation for the practical applications of physics in everyday life.

Facilitator: Sachin Gupta is a PhD Candidate at the University of Massachusetts Boston working on understanding Quantum Physics at the foundation level. He has been into teaching for more than 10 years and loves physics so much, he can talk all day about the subject. Labor in the U.S.: Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow [Video conference from UMass to Braintree]

The course will look at the past, present, and future of unions and the world of work. In the late 19th century, unions established a presence in our political and economic life, facing constant violence and opposition. Workers organized on an unprecedented scale in the 1930s, leading to a long period of prosperity and labor peace in the post WWII era. Millions of Americans entered the middle class and established organized labor as a vehicle for social mobility. In the late 1970s and 1980s the business community, supported by an emerging right-wing political opposition, launched an assault on union influence and drove an agenda that diminished the percentage of American workers in unions from 35% to 10%. Globalization and the fissuring of the economy contributed to labor's decline as well. There are signs of creative forms of organizing in the changing workforce – among low-waged workers, women and workers of color, and workers in the new

"innovation economy." The last two sessions will focus on the increasingly precarious conditions at work, the gig economy, some of the new forms of organizing, and whether organized labor can challenge fundamental issues of income inequality and global corporate power.

Facilitator: Mark Erlich has been a Wertheim Fellow at the Harvard Law School's Center for Labor & a Just Economy since retiring as head of the New England Regional Council of Carpenters in 2017. In addition to his long career in the trades and the labor movement, Mark has written and lectured extensively on labor issues. He is the author of *The Way We Build: Restoring Dignity to Construction Work* (2023) as well as two other books and dozens of essays, articles, and op-eds on labor history, politics, and contemporary union issues. Toni Morrison's The Bluest Eye

We will remember the life and legacy of Nobel Prizewinning author Toni Morrison through a deep analysis and discussion of her first novel. *The Bluest Eye* asks powerful questions about race, class, gender, history and memory with the subtlety and grace that characterized all of her writing. Students will examine the beauty and complexity of her prose and its impact, as it – in her own words – "tried to hit the raw nerve of racial self-contempt, expose it, then soothe it not with narcotics but with language."

Facilitator: Joshua Frank is President of Equity Intersection where he provides Adult Education in Racial Equity and American History. He worked as an educator for twenty-eight years in Massachusetts public schools. He completed his undergraduate education at UMass/Amherst and Master's degrees from UMass/Boston and the Harvard Graduate School of Education. Don't Believe Everything You Think

"Questioning your own thinking creates S P A C E for new thoughts to change your life." We are moving into new age of possibilities in 2025 and many higher level energies are here to support us. In order to reach these energies and touch the truest part of ourselves, we have to begin to release and let go of the thinking and belief systems that no longer are in harmony with us. In order to open up space for this part of all of us, we have to start to question the 70,000 thoughts and old paradigm of belief systems that are running through our minds and subconscious every day. Science tells us that 80% of these thoughts are negative and 95% of them are repetitive. What if we could create more spaces with less thinking and more feeling? Less analysis of old repetitive stories / thoughts / programs that no longer serve us? How might we begin to live in this new way? In this 5-week series, we will be exploring these ideas with weekly discussion, exercises and meditation.

Facilitator: Katherine Robinson majored in psychology and anthropology at the University of Vermont. She also did graduate training in mental health counseling and is certified by the McLean Meditation Institute (AZ) and Yoga Body. She recently became a certified Brain Longevity Therapist through the Alzheimer's Research & Prevention Foundation. Her passions are teaching meditation, breathwork and energy techniques to calm the body & grow new neurons in the brain. She loves to explore the healing vibrations of sound and motivate and inspire others to be the best that they can be. S Medieval Rituals and Religious Practices in Europe: From Paganism to Christianity

Before Christianity, a rich tapestry of religious beliefs and practices existed in Europe that are essentially our ancestral legacy. Through a historical lens, this course will explore the rituals, festivals, and spiritual practices of Viking, Celtic, and other pre-Christian traditions, including seasonal celebrations, burial customs, and sacred sites. We'll investigate how people understood their relationship with nature, spirits, and deities through various practices and ceremonies. The course then traces how these traditions evolved, merged with, or were replaced by Christian practices, revealing the complex spiritual landscape of medieval Europe and the lasting influence of these beliefs on European culture.

Facilitator: Liilu Hansen is a historian of Scandinavian studies who returned to grad school after 20 years. Her family is from Denmark where she has lived and worked. She speaks Danish and other Nordic languages. Liilu founded the Norse Community of SLC and leads Ancestor Tours to Northern Europe to help folks discover and connect with their ancestors. She lives in Utah with her four children where she regularly organizes Nordic pagan celebrations, much to the surprise of her conservative neighbors. **Dates:** 5 Mondays, 9/8–10/20 (no class on 9/22 and 10/13) **Time:** 6:30–8:00 p.m.

The Art of Daily Life

Presented by the Cleveland Museum of Art The objects we surround ourselves with in life and death have many stories to tell. We often learn about the lives of ancient cultures through the objects made for their homes and their burial spaces. From tableware, to furniture, to textiles – similar kinds of artworks are still valued in our lives today. We might categorize these items as decorative arts, but throughout history, these objects have been prized for their utility, their beauty, and their symbolism. Session topics will include the special focus gallery exhibition Rose Iron Works and Art Deco, as well as various decorative arts across the museum's exhibitions and permanent collection.

Facilitator: Arielle Levine of the Cleveland Museum of Art teaches students all around the world during video conferences in the museum's Distance Learning Program. She has a degree in art history from Case Western Reserve University and has been with the museum's education department for over 15 years. The Master and Margarita: Magical Realism in Moscow?

Mikhail Bulgakov, who was not allowed to publish anything during most of his lifetime, left a literary legacy of plays and short stories and the novel, *The Master and Margarita*, completed in 1940, but not published until 1967. The novel pushes Bulgakov's fantastic and humorous satire to extremes to present a wide-ranging and critical picture of Stalin's Russia in the 1930s. Where did this amazing work come from and why is it unique in Russian literature? How is it like other works of magical realism, such as Gabriel Garcia Marquez's *One Hundred Years of Solitude*? What purpose does this style serve in allowing a writer to tell his story? **Facilitator:** Patricia Suhrcke received her PhD in Russian Literature from the University of Chicago. She previously taught Russian literature in translation in Chicago and Atlanta. She has been facilitating course for OLLI since 2016 and enjoys using her experience leading public dialogues to discuss the great Russian novels with interested readers.

S The Healing Power of Music

Music is a powerful tool for healing, connection, and personal growth. Whether through active participation (singing, playing instruments) or passive listening, music has physical and psychological benefits that promote our overall well-being. This course delves into the profound impact of music on mental, emotional, and physical well-being. Students will explore the science of music therapy and experiences that highlight music as a powerful healing tool. We will also talk about the history of the relationship between music and health, music and the brain, music therapy, music and older adults, and indigenous healing practices.

Facilitator: Patricia Zarate Perez is a doctoral student in the Global Inclusion and Social Development PhD program at the University of Massachusetts Boston. She holds a Bachelor's degree in Music Therapy from Berklee College of Music and a Master's degree in Jazz Studies from New York University. Currently, she is working on her dissertation, which explores how the musical experiences of children living in extreme poverty in Panama can inform social development policy. In addition to her research, Patricia serves on the faculty of the Berklee Global Jazz Institute.

The Scope of Presidential Power and the Role of the Courts: Navigating a Constitutional Crisis Under Trump 2.0

This course will examine the expansion of the power of the executive branch since Donald Trump took office in January, and the efficacy of the system of checks and balances envisioned by the framers of the Constitution. The course will first examine the Trump agenda from a political science perspective, noting parallels between the actions of the Trump administration and the erosion of democracy in other countries. The course will also provide a primer on presidential power under Article II of the Constitution, before turning to the Trump agenda in 2025, its precursors, and the legal theories underlying this agenda. The last classes will evaluate the role of the federal courts in placing limits on excessive executive power and consider the nature and implications of a constitutional crisis.

Facilitator: John S. Ross, III (Jack) holds degrees from Yale University (A.B. in history), the University of Virginia School of Law (J.D.), and New York University School of Law (LL.M.). He practiced law in Washington, D.C. for twenty years and served as Adjunct Professor of Law at Washington and Lee University School of Law. Jack serves as an instructor in constitutional law at the Worcester Institute for Senior Education at Assumption University, and has taught classes in the OLLI program on the Supreme Court. **Dates:** 5 Mondays, 10/20–11/17

From Mark Twain to James Baldwin to Percival Everett: The Meaning of American Racial Innocence

Rooted in our reading of Percival Everett's 2024 National Book Award for Fiction winner *James*, we will trace the evolution of American racial innocence from Mark Twain's *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn* in 1884, through James Baldwin's *The Fire Next Time* in 1963, to Everett's *James*, a thought-provoking re-imagining of Huckleberry Finn. Through our analysis of racial innocence, we will explore the nature of our racial, cultural, political, and social identities in our current era of seismic demographic and political change. Required book: *James* by Percival Everett.

S Analyzing 911 Calls: Language, Power and Emergency Communication

In February 2006, 5-year-old Robert Turner's emergency calls to 911 were dismissed as pranks, resulting in his mother's death, an example of how split-second decisions by 911 call operators could determine someone's fate. Using Critical Discourse Analysis, this course explores the linguistic and contextual factors that influence these decisions. We will listen to selected 911 calls and analyse how caller identity, perceived credibility, narrative structure, event sequence, and the experiences of call takers shape their responses to callers. By the end of the course, you will be able to evaluate emergency call interactions and suggest improvements for emergency response systems.

Facilitator: Chisom Nlebedum is a PhD student and research assistant in the Applied Linguistics Department at UMass Boston. His research interests focus on critical language pedagogy and sociolinguistics. He obtained a master's in applied linguistics from the University of Glasgow. Chisom enjoys long walks and socialising with people in his neighbourhood.

She has a long academic background in communication and media studies and has worked on mediarelated issues, especially around gender representation and storytelling. Her current research focuses on gender equity and social justice, and she brings a global, interdisciplinary lens to the classroom. S Tracing the Historical Tracks of Human Rights

We need to pause and appreciate how far the human rights movement has come and then ponder how much further we need to go. Predicting the future of human rights is easier when you know its history and its present trajectory. This course explores the landscape of human rights and its evolution over the past 1,500 years. It will review the five eras of human rights starting with allied concepts in ancient civilizations. We will then look at the impact of the Magna Carta of 1215 before discussing the philosophers in the Age of Enlightenment who were critical to the molding of the French and American revolutions. Finally, we will explore how the atrocities of World War II made way for the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and end with human rights in these contemporary times and the role YOU play.

Facilitator: Abi Baiyewu has spent the breadth of her life working on human rights issues across Africa, and building the capacity of underserved communities to advocate for the protection of their rights. She is currently a Ph.D student at UMass Boston.

These classes provide a welcoming and supportive environment where older adults can explore the joy of dance. This course can be taken standing or seated. This course includes 1) Adaptive techniques: We adapt ballet and modern dance principles to make it accessible to everyone. 2) A gentle warm-up: Classes start with a gentle warm-up to prepare the body for movement and reduce the risk of injury. 3) Technique and expression: Participants will learn the foundations of ballet and modern dance techniques, allowing for creative expression. 4) Balance and strength: Exercises will improve balance and strength, supporting overall health and fall prevention. 5) Community and fun: Our classes foster a sense of community and provide an enjoyable space to connect and through dance. Course Note: Since this course seeks to accommodate all participants, it is essential that students make it possible for the instructor to provide feedback. It is useful for participants to leave their Zoom camera on so the instructor can most effectively guide and encourage participants.

Facilitator: Maja Nadel from Abilities Dance Boston. Abilities Dance centers disability culture through our performing company and community engagement programs. Working across language divides, varying disabilities, and more, teachers are trained with a curriculum that values social/ emotional/physical wellness over technique readiness. Our goal is a rich appreciation of Shakespeare's plays.

Books Borrowed in Boston 1827-1850: Tales from the Boston Athenaeum

[This course is a repeat from Spring 2025.] The Boston Athenaeum is one of America's oldest and largest private libraries. This course provides a detailed view of the books borrowed from the library by Boston's railroad and canal builders, scientists, doctors, inventors, architects, engineers, teachers, and children's book authors between 1827 and 1850. From Florence Price's "Symphony No. 1 in E minor" to Julia Perry's "Stabat Mater" to Undine Smith Moore's "Scenes from the Life of a Martyr," these pieces have something special to share with classical music lovers, unique to the influence of African American Spirituals and other styles of music that emerged from African American culture. In this course, we will listen to and discuss the works of these black women symphonic composers and learn how the narratives they bravely scored still have relevance today.

The Real Aims of American Foreign Policy – What American History Teaches Us

Since the end of the Cold War, America has appeared to stand alone as the global superpower. But as recent dangerous conflicts with Russia and China over Ukraine and Taiwan have broken out, many believe that we are in new territory in our relations with the rest of the world. But are we? The first half of this course will focus on the current war in Ukraine, continuing tensions with China, and the Gaza crisis. For the remainder of our time together, participants are invited to propose historical issues and events for discussion, for example: the Mexican War (1846-48), the sinking of the Lusitania (1917), the attack on Pearl Harbor, the atomic bombings in Japan, the Vietnam War, etc. Through considering these historical examples as well as current foreign policy realities, we will seek for answers to big questions, such as -Is it true that the United States usually goes to war only reluctantly, only in opposition to the threats and aggressions of other states? Have America's foreign

policies always fostered and promoted democracies and avoided conflict at all costs? Please bring your own questions and curiosity.

Facilitator: Paul Atwood, Ph.D. is a retired faculty at UMass Boston where he taught for over 35 years in the American Studies Department and the Honors College. He began his study of U.S. foreign policy because of his military service during the Vietnam War and has continued his research and analysis to the present day.

In concert with these developments, astrophysicists used these tools to achieve new insights into the history and composition of our vast physical universe. We will explore these developments of the past 120 years in a nonmathematical manner. While some basic scientific knowledge is helpful to keep up with this course, you do not need in-depth knowledge of physics. S Reimagining Disability: Liberation, **Resistance**, and Identity

For a long time in many parts of the world, disability has been stigmatized as a bad thing – a curse, a hurdle, an obstacle, a barrier. But what if we talked about disability a little differently? What if we believed that sometimes disability is empowering? This class explores disability through a social justice-oriented lens, challenging traditional narratives and advocating for change. Students will learn key concepts in disabilities studies, gaining vocabulary to discuss disability more effectively with each other and, hopefully, friends and family, too. Through reflection and dialogue, this course encourages students to rethink assumptions and confront biases. Whether you identify as someone with a disability, are close to someone with a disability, or haven't really approached this topic until now, this course invites you to join the conversation and imagine what it would be like to live in a more inclusive world.

Facilitator: Josh Chou is a doctoral student in the UMass Boston Clinical Psychology PhD Program, researching socioemotional well-being among autistic young people through a neurodiversity-affirming lens. He previously graduated from UCLA with a Bachelor of Science in Psychobiology, as well as double minors in Disability Studies and Global Health.

Hans Memling and the Italian Renaissance

This course will focus on Hans Memling, who by 1480 was recognized as the leading artist in Bruges and the most favored by Italian patrons. Italians, including fellow artists like Leonardo Da Vinci, became among Memling's most ardent admirers, with the result that he had a greater influence on Italian art than many of his Flemish contemporaries. He had an incredible ability to capture the likeness of his subjects, both in small portraits and in his altarpiece depictions of patrons and their families. Memling was the first Flemish artist to include Italian Renaissance motifs, such as putti, garlands, and gilded statues, which he integrated into gothic architecture. A classic example of these stylistic innovations is the "Pagagnotti Triptych" at the Uffizi Gallery in Florence and the two wing panels at the National Gallery in London. Note: This is a continuation

of the 2023 course on the Dutch Golden Age in the 17th century and the 2024 course on Flemish Art in the 15th century; however, it is not necessary to have taken those courses to appreciate this one.

Facilitator: Lucinda Gorry has facilitated many OLLI courses, including several recent ones on Dutch artists. She has also researched and created lectures and courses on 19th-century Boston women artists, James McNeill Whistler, Édouard Manet, Berthe Morisot, Edgar Degas, Mary Cassatt, and many others. A Beatles Musical History Tour: From Liverpool to Abbey Road (Part 2 of 3)

In Part 2 (this session), the Beatles open their third U.S. tour before a world record crowd at NYC's Shea Stadium in August 1965. That fall they release Rubber Soul. 1966's Revolver, released just before their final tour, showed even greater studio experimentation, sophisticated songwriting, and an expanded repertoire of musical styles: "Love You Too" (all Indian instruments), "Eleanor Rigby" (strings), and "Tomorrow Never Knows" (tape loops). Part 2 concludes with Sqt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band and Magical Mystery Tour.

Facilitator: Gene Shwalb graduated from Oberlin Conservatory where he studied piano and cello. He received his M.Ed. from UMass Boston and recently retired after 17 years as a Learning Designer at UMass Boston. Gene edits the Music Museum of New England website: MMONE.org. Great Artists in American Roots Music

This course is an **online** continuation of the popular Great Artists in American Roots Music series and is appropriate for both new and repeat students. From its birth amid the rapid changes in American culture in the first years of the 20th century, country music has continually appealed to people from various backgrounds who feel left behind by a rapidly changing world. Country music, a key genre in American roots music, not only expresses the hardships of modern life, but also purposefully evokes an emotional response. Whether you are stuck in a troubled relationship, unemployed, homeless, spiritually bereft, or just lonesome, there's a country song for you. Each session of "Great Artists in American Roots Music" will involve a dynamic mix of lecture, performance and discussion. We will move beyond a historical survey of American roots music to focus on the individual stories and artistic developments of particular roots artists including the Carter Family, Hank Williams, Bill Monroe and Loretta Lynn. These stories will also help us to understand the roles race, class and gender have played in the history and reception of country music.

Facilitator: Taylor Ackley is first and foremost a folk musician. Born into a working-class family with a remarkable musical heritage, his work was influenced by generations of pickers, singers, songwriters and fiddlers across his family. He holds a Master's Degree and PhD in Composition and a Master's Degree in Ethnomusicology from Stony Brook University. His scholarly work examines American folk and popular music through analysis, composition, historical research, performance and ethnography.

Facilitator: Afsana Alam is a PhD student in Public Policy at UMass Boston with a long background in social justice, culture, and equity. She has studied and written about crosscultural perspectives on resilience, well-being, and justice. Originally from Bangladesh, Afsana brings a global lens and a deep interest in stories of hope, connection, and healing. She is passionate about creating thoughtful spaces for reflection, curiosity, and shared wisdom.

Exploring the Boston Harbor Islands: On Land, Sea, and the Islands

[This course is a repeat from Spring 2025.] The Boston Harbor Islands National and State Park is a stone's throw from UMass Boston. The beauty of the islands surrounds the campus and beckons discovery. Each of the Park's 34 islands is an integral part of New England's pre-history, history, present, and future. They offer a rich heritage and combination of natural, cultural, and historic resources. Archaeologists have established that they were used or inhabited by humans at least 8,000 years ago. They have been designated an Archaeological District on the National Register of Historic Places. This five-week course will include a classroom orientation session at UMass Boston, an introductory boat tour of the Islands, a boat trip and walking tour of Cathleen Stone Island (formerly known as Thompson Island), a field trip to the MWRA Deer Island Wastewater Treatment Plant, and a second field trip (specific island TBA). We will travel on the UMass Boston vessel M/V Columbia Point, rain or shine. <u>Course Notes:</u> To defray the charter costs, OLLI students are required to pay \$100 total for the field trips. This course is not appropriate for OLLI members using wheelchairs or other mobility aids. Participants should be able to board a boat and walk unassisted on uneven ground – rugged paths and trails. Plan to bring a picnic lunch and water.

Facilitator: Suzanne Gall Marsh has been leading OLLI programs to the Harbor Islands and local National Parks and maritime sites since 2009. She received a BA from UMass Boston College of Public and Community Service and participated in the university's Women in Politics and Public Policy program. She is the founder and board member of Friends of the Boston Harbor Islands who celebrated its 45th anniversary in 2024. She has developed a variety of public

history programs – landside and public boat trips. Spoiled Eden: Dystopian Short Stories

Every paradise has its forbidden fruit. Sometimes a bite gives way to knowledge of the thin civilization that contains us. Sometimes it serves as a drug to qualm every existential worry. What is it, then, about human nature that tends toward dystopia? What is evil, and do dystopian societies suggest that such a malevolent condition is inherent to humankind? In this class, we'll focus on a number of short stories that explore this very theme, including pieces by Ray Bradbury, Octavia Butler, Kurt Vonnegut, Harlan Ellison, Ursula K. Le Guin, and many others. In these texts, we'll explore the political, socio-economic, and psychological forces that shape dystopian societies, and attempt to uncover the origins of such a "fallen world."

Facilitator: Michele Harris received a BA in English from Allegheny College and an MFA in poetry from UMass Boston. She is the author of the poetry collection Blackdamp (David Robert Books, 2019), a recipient of the 2011 David A. Kennedy prize, and a finalist for the 2018 New Millennium Award. Bridging Divides: Cultural Differences and Misperceptions in a Globalized World

This five-week course explores how cultural perceptions influence global interactions, diplomacy, and political dynamics, often leading to misunderstanding and conflict. Through an interdisciplinary lens—combining insights from sociology, anthropology, international relations, and media studies—participants will examine both historical and contemporary examples of cultural divides. Topics include the effects of globalization, migration, and digital communication on identity and cross-cultural engagement. Engaging with scholarly readings, interactive discussions, and real-world case studies, participants will gain a deeper, more nuanced understanding of how culture shapes our world—and how dialogue can help bridge divides in a rapidly globalizing society. **Facilitator:** Dr. Muhammad Iqbal Uddin Arif holds a PhD in Climate Change Governance and has an interdisciplinary background in English literature, electoral politics, and gender studies. His work explores global governance, cultural perceptions, and women's agency, with a passion for fostering cross-cultural understanding and bridging divides in an increasingly globalized world.

Euripides' Alcestis: For Whom To Die

Through this drama, students will be introduced to Euripides as craftsman of the unexpected, as a "modernist" who colors outside the lines in personal ways for Greeks and moderns. Students will realize that what was predictable myth has becomes a platform for innovative, searing commentary. The writer transforms surrogacy—the trading of a life for a life—into familial, trans-generational intimacy, requiring students to consider their own value systems—for whom, for what, and under what circumstances they would self-sacrifice. The dramatist aligns his issues along a psychological continuum of god, demigod, and mortal, signaling that nothing exists in a stovepipe...that instability and heartache beget more of the same. Pre-reading: Euripides' *Alcestis* in a version of the student's choice.

Facilitator: Craig Miller holds a doctorate in theology, specializing in classical languages, long experience in teaching on the contemporary power of ancient Greek culture, and a commitment to immerse adult learners in that intriguing experience.

OLLI Course and Registration Information

Facilitators

OLLI course facilitators and OLLI Talk presenters share their areas of expertise with OLLI students on a volunteer basis. A course evaluation form is provided at the end of each course, and your constructive suggestions are welcomed by our facilitators. If you would like to complete an evaluation before the end of the course, please request a form from the OLLI office.

S OLLI Scholars

This symbol indicates courses that are taught by UMass Boston graduate students under the OLLI Scholar program. The OLLI Curriculum Committee reviews proposals, interviews candidates, and mentors students from various graduate programs on campus. If accepted into the program, OLLI Scholars receive a stipend after successful completion of their courses. This intergenerational experience benefits both UMass graduate students and OLLI members.

Course Fees

- \$40 per course for OLLI Carte members, or
- Free for Full/Unlimited members.

Additional fees are sometimes required for courses that involve off-campus activities, special events, or a high amount of handout copying or instructional supplies.

Course fees are due a week after final course confirmations are released.

Course Cancellation

OLLI reserves the right to cancel a scheduled course because of low registration, non-availability of a facilitator, or any other unavoidable circumstance. Students will be notified as soon as possible.

Course Capacities

The maximum number of students registered for each course depends on the course topic (some may work best with a smaller class size) and the preference of the facilitator. If requests for a course exceed capacity, the registration priority system is used to determine who will be enrolled, based on the priorities set by each registrant.

Course Registration Process

OLLI at UMass Boston uses a priority/lottery system to determine final course registrations. Full and OLLI Carte members must submit their course requests before the **Priority Registration Deadline of August 15** to be included in the lottery allocation process.

Please list your course choices in order of priority (highest priority = 1, and so on) on the Course Request Form or when using OLLI's online registration system. How does the lottery work? If demand exceeds the number of seats for a course, the computer assigns those seats by lottery based on your priority rankings.

Course requests received after the **August 15** deadline will be assigned based on availability on a first-come, first-served basis.

Paper Registration: Please complete the Course Request Form on page 32 and mail or fax to the OLLI office.

Online Registration: All current OLLI members have an account they can use for online course requests and registrations. Visit OLLI's online registration site where instructions are posted on how to use the system. Site address: https://www.campusce.net/umb/category/ category.aspx

Course Confirmation: Students are not registered for courses until they receive a final confirmation. Confirmations will be emailed in late August. Please pay close attention to the details of the confirmation correspondence: "registered" means a student has been confirmed to attend the class; "not registered" means the course was oversubscribed, and the course request could not be accommodated.

Dropping or Adding Courses: Requests to drop a course or other OLLI program are handled by the OLLI office. Please email ollireg@gmail.com or call 617.287.7312 as soon as you determine that you will not be able to attending a program for which you are confirmed. If you would like to be placed on a waitlist for a course or program that is full, please contact the OLLI office, and you will be notified if a space becomes available.

Let's Turn a Page and Get Reading Together

OLLI Reads is an initiative that was created by OLLI's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee in summer 2022. Along the way we will read and discuss various books in the hope of having a better understanding of the world around us. *OLLI Reads* is open to all OLLI members and community guests and enables us to come together as a community that is reading and discussing the same book. We hope you will be part of our *OLLI Reads*.

Book selection. *Being Heumann: An Unrepentant Memoir of a Disability Rights Activist* by Judith Heumann. Through *Being Heumann*, one of the most influential disability rights activists in U.S. history tells her personal story of fighting for the right to receive an education, have a job, and just be human. From fighting to attend grade school after being described as a "fire hazard" to later winning a lawsuit against the New York City school system for denying her a teacher's license because of her paralysis, Judy's actions set a precedent that fundamentally improved rights for disabled people. Working with a community of over 150 disabled activists and allies, Judy successfully pressured the Carter administration to implement protections for disabled peoples' rights, sparking a national movement and leading to the creation of the Americans with Disabilities Act.

End of summer book discussion and related events. The following summer programs have been created to continue conversations started with Judy's memoir. Participants can register for these events by visiting the <u>OLLI website</u>:

- *Being Heumann* online discussion: Thursday, August 21 at 10:00 a.m. (via Zoom)
- Local disability rights pioneer and activist, Charlie Carr, will speak on Wednesday, September 3 at 3:30 p.m. via Zoom.
